Progress Achieved

Progress Achieved:	In the project period (from July 2019– June 2020), there were thirteen visiting educators facilitated in two workshops to train 75 medical personnel on care of burn and plastic surgery. Altogether 36 camps were conducted in different strategic locations of the country to correct the deformities of cleft (184) deformities and post burn contracture (133) in Butwal, Nepalgunj, Pokhara, Biratnagar and Bharatpur. The routine services from Kirtipur hospital was also carried out and a total of 156 cleft patients benefited with free surgeries for correction of facial cleft deformities. Total of 41 post burn contracture patients benefited with the free services for reconstructive Surgeries for Post- Burn Contracture. Three camps for speech therapy and dental camps organized out of Kathmandu. Altogether 211 cleft patients received speech therapy and among them 23 discharged with improved speech.
Key Problems:	There were 211 cleft patients received dental services.
Steps Taken to Solve Problems:	

- o To carry out year shifted activities in addition to the planned activities for the coming years to cover the shortfalls of the achievement in previous project years.
- o To provide effective treatment service to the late arrival of the acute burn cases
- o Almost all burn cases need financial support and the treatment of the acute burn cases is very expensive.
- o Higher bed occupancy rate of the burn cases
- o Due to COVID 19 pandemic situation, government imposed nationwide lockdown the planned events could not conduct.

- o Scale up and expansion of Plastic and Reconstructive surgeries camps services in other district to cover the needy people of all provinces of the Country in collaboration with Ministry of Health and Population, Government of Nepal
- o To initiate the education fellowship program to exchange the experience and skill in management of the cases
- o Transfer skill to government employee in plastic and reconstructive and burn care management through capacity building activities
- o Conduct awareness program on burn injury prevention
- o Carry out training program on Hand Surgery, free hand surgeries for poor people and Increase

microsurgerieso Look for funding to get supplies for the acute burn care to decrease the cost to poor people.o To include the PBC follow up cases in reimbursement system.o To provide the educational fellowship to paramedics as well. There a provision for doctors only in project agreement.o The services would be delivered with high precautionary measures to prevent COVID-19.
